

From the Wardens

It's hard to believe that Fr. Brad has only been gone for three weeks. Normally, March is a month of transition. We transition from the cold and grey of winter to the warm and colors of spring; from the solemnness of Lent to the promise of rebirth and Easter!!

However, I think we can all agree that this month of March 2020 has been like no other. There seemed to be no transition, no subtle yet noticeable change, just change. "Social Distancing" has entered our vocabulary and as of this writing, there is no end in sight. We hope that you and yours are all healthy and staying safe.

At St. Anne's, we have had to make the difficult decision to suspend worship services and really any sort of gathering. It was

decided for us by state and federal guidelines. However, a few of us (fewer than 10) have decided to gather, observing the requisite six feet apart from one another to record and post a shortened version of the church service each week. There are more details about this endeavor later in this edition of this letter. We hope that these recordings will bring you some sense of normalcy in a very un-normal world. We hope to continue this service to our parishioners each week for as long as we must. Thanks to Rev. Jonathan for being willing to preside over these services and to those participating in the service and recording it.

The health concerns of today have ground everything to a halt, including our search for a PIC. The diocese has notified us that they have suspended all Rector and PIC searches until at least April

20. The diocese leaders will reassess in mid-April and notify us.

Unfortunately, the one thing that continues to happen despite a worldwide pandemic are our bills. We understand that many people are in fear for not only their physical health, but also their psychological and financial health. Please keep your pledges up to date as you are able.

With all your help and prayers, we hope that St. Anne's will come back stronger and better than ever once the health crisis is over.

VIRTUAL SERVICES

I thought I'd write a bit about how we're getting the videos available for you each Sunday. As we started discussing either recording or broadcasting services while everything is closed, I started looking through the collection of stuff I have and some of the other things I could get quickly and inexpensively.

We wound up with a good quality microphone, a camcorder I got off of eBay, and a tripod to put it all on. There's also a collection of lights to make everything look brighter.

The morning starts at about 8:30AM when we all get together and decide how we want the flow to work. Fortunately, the service and music has already been figured out. Rev. Jonathan and Peter start their preparations while Sandra, Ed, and I figure out lights and where to arrange things, then double- and

triple-check that all the equipment is set up. Once we're all ready to go, we press record and off we go. As the experts have advised, we're doing our own physical distancing from each other, standing in different parts of the altar and different parts out in the pews.

Because of the equipment we're using it's a lot easier to record and then share rather than live stream. Our Internet connection is only so fast, and the WiFi in the main church area is not sufficient to do a lot of streaming.

Once the service is over, we stop the recording and then the computer work begins. Right now, we're just uploading directly to YouTube and to Facebook. This is time consuming as the resulting file is pretty big - 5GB and we have to upload it twice, once to each of YouTube and Facebook. After it's uploaded, we have to wait for them to process the file, but we can do things like add the title and descriptions while that goes on. The upload takes about 20 minutes and the processing is about the same amount of time. Our first week was a bit of a struggle to understand how uploads work, but by the second week it went by a lot faster and everything was done by about 11AM.

Next up is figuring out how to make introductory credits and add them in to make it look nicer and available for a wider audience on BATV.

I really want to thank everyone who's helped make this a reality: Sandra, Ed, Peter, Maria, Rev. Jonathan, and Sue. I hope you're finding some small comfort and community in what we're doing, and I look forward to seeing everyone in person.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH CORNER

Over 325 Billerica families were fed at the Billerica Community Pantry distribution in March; normally it is approximately 150-200. If you are able your financial support is needed as we continue to feed our neighbors.

Due to pandemic we changed our operation for distributions to ensure the health of our clients and volunteers.

People who wanted to receive had to preregister; with this information we were able to pre-order food to ensure we had enough. 22,000 pounds of food was ordered for this distribution – and we needed it, many people are struggling. People did NOT come in the building; groceries were delivered right to the trunks of cars. The deepest gratitude goes out to the many volunteers, the Billerica Police Department, and Billerica Emergency Management. This would not have been possible without you! This will most likely be the new norm until the Virus passes.
