
3. Put <u>yourself last</u>. You might want to put yourself first, but selfishness only brings temporary happiness or pleasure, not lasting joy.

"For by the grace given me I say to every one of you: Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the measure of faith God has given you." (Romans 12:3)

- 4. Read the letter and words on each section in numbered order.






What Did He Do?



Directions: Cut out the puzzle pieces. Fit them together to discover what Jesus did to give us peace.




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
Materials

- 1. Color the back of each paper plate green or brown and draw lines on them to make them look like the top and bottom of a turtle shell. (The turtle's top shell should be darker; the bottom one lighter.
- 2. Color and cut out the turtle head, feet, and tail on this page.
- 3. Glue the tabs of the head, feet, and tail to the uncolored side of one of the paper plates.
- 4. Glue the two plates together around the edges with the colored sides out.
- 5. Cut out the rhyme and glue it to the turtle's back.
- 6. Read the rhyme. Talk about some times when you get finished quickly and need to wait patiently for others.



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

- 3. Read Romans 13:10. God would like all of us to be "harmless," not hurting others but helping.






