Dear Parish of St. Anne's,

I begin with a quote from our Bishops: "live gently with ourselves and one another". This is my deepest prayer for us all, to live gently with ourselves. For me, I have found greater health when I practice no judgment but instead graciousness. Perhaps, applying it to oneself is the hardest task! But one that is worth it.

At an August Zoom meeting of leaders and our Diocese, Canon Bill Parnell relayed some highlights from a monthly meeting of all the Episcopal bishops in the United States. He was proud to tell us that the speaker had been **Dr**.

Anthony Fauci who had hammered home three things that are effective in combatting our pandemic: (1) universal wearing of masks; (2) avoid crowds; (3) physical distancing.

These three things remain always at the forefront of your Re-Gathering Team's planning meetings. For this is what Love looks like, to remember our Presiding Bishop.

Across the Diocese, 50 congregations have been given permission to re-gather in person. Some do so indoors, others outdoors. 110 out of our total 175 congregations are doing some form of worship. 100 are working with Re-Gathering Shepherds.

I close by quoting two paragraphs from our Bishops in their June pastoral letter to the Diocese. I commend their care and concern for us all.

"The work ahead is daunting, but we are certain that taking the time for careful planning is essential. It is rooted in the covenant we make with one another at baptism to "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as

yourself." Our deepest hope is that our efforts to support one another in these decisions and preparations will indeed be manifestations of our love of God and one another.

Finally, in times of anxiety, frustration, and grief, may we live gently with ourselves and one another. Mistakes will be made. Decision fatigue will be inevitable. Disappointment will be around the corner, again and again. So too will there be grace and discovery, as we continue to claim our identity as a people of hope and new beginnings. May we do so with patience, forgiveness and good will!"

Never forget, dear Parish, to "live gently with ourselves and one another".

From the Wardens

As you may know, **the Thrift Shop is open!** thanks to the diligent work done by the Re-Gathering team, Linda, Marguerite, Kathy and Ken. The State and Diocesan requirements have been met; a written plan was approved that describes how the Shop will function during the Covid-19 pandemic. The team will continue to work towards plans to open the church for a live service, allow groups such as AA, Al Anon, and NA to resume meeting, and get the Explorers pre-school open and running. There is still quite a lot to be done, but things are moving along.

The Worship team is currently working on the issue of how to continue producing video recordings for those who will not be able to attend live services. The trick is to find a way to produce a video without creating obstructions (visual or physical) to the live congregation. This will involve some new video recording equipment and we've applied for and received a grant from the diocese to cover some of that cost. Moving forward, it's important to have a video system that can be operated by more than one individual (currently Mark) with a minimum level of training. We recently recorded a Sunday service with the re-gathering team present so that they could see what a live service would be like using our current recording equipment. Both teams profited from the experience and spent a good deal of time discussing everything from movement to music after the service concluded.

On top of everything else, it's time to start thinking about stewardship. Time, Talent and Treasure is hard to think about in the middle of a pandemic, but many people are contributing significant Time and Talent to keep things going as noted above. Many continue to contribute financially (Treasure) through their pledge, but now is the time to begin looking at next years' needs when, hopefully, we will have the Covid-19 more under control.

Prayer from 1910.

"Our Father, we acknowledge our manifold sins – we do earnestly repent and are heartily sorry these our misdoings. Have mercy upon us, O God, and teach us to have mercy on ourselves by learning never to follow a first mistake by a second – always to lean the future by the past, and ever to rise on stepping stones of our dead selves to higher things. Amen. Psalm 120." From Prayers for Dark People. UMass Press. 1980. p. 47.

This prayer was written by WEB DuBois, around 1910. He was the first African American to receive a PhD from Harvard University in 1895.

I first heard about this at a Letter-writing to Congress event with the Diocesan Ministry of Immigration Partnership last month where Bp Gayle shared a prayer from the above collection. I was so struck by many things that I wanted to share it with you all.

Especially 8:00ers, isn't his opening startling? He must have attended many Episcopal services! Perhaps even in Cambridge, MA!





THRIFT SHOP IS OPEN!!!

We are back open for business for customers and we are accepting donations. New customers and faithful patrons are slowing returning to the thrift shop. Our new hours are Wednesday and Friday from 10AM until 2PM. As business increases, we may open another day. New Addition



It took a while, but we are well on our way to having a sign for the parking lot. You may remember we obtained a grant to improve the signage last year prior to Covid. Kathy and Marguerite have been working hard with the sign vendor to make this happen on our budget. Permits have been obtained and work should start soon.

Our Parish Survey

Your leadership and Re-Gathering teams are grateful to those who returned their surveys. The normal response rate is 26%-33%, and we had a 29% response rate. So, thank you. Your answers and thoughts cover the whole spectrum, but there are trends that help us to make plans for our gradual reopening of worship, hopefully in October. Thank you for taking the time to return the survey.

We learned that 36% of our 50 respondents watch the online service weekly, and 38% do sometimes totaling almost 75%. Most of our Sunday morning congregants have been able to continue worshipping, through the dedicated effort every single week of our parishioner film crew.

62% of our respondents said they would feel safe attending services with the restrictions and compliance requirements outlined. 36% would likely attend in-person services once they resume while 44% stated they might attend. Many shared the reason(s) why they would not attend in-person. And, too, some shared comments indicating how much they miss: the fellowship of being together, communion and even spiritual communion rather than morning prayer, and all things just being normal.

The yearning to return to being together is vividly clear. And this is the pain of eucharistic fasting: as members of Christ's Body, we are not meant to live without each other!

Yet, world and local health situations mean that loving each other requires we honor each other's boundaries. For some, the coronavirus presents low risk while for others, it could mean hastened death. Our ultimate giving of love to our friends needs to accept their boundaries, wherever they may be.

This is quite a moment to wonder what Jesus would do?
