

It was a time to share scripture, music, prayer, and discussions of Hope:

"Hope in a year of Job" - a talk given by Kathy Doller

Scripture: Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

Biblical definition of Hope: The foundation of biblical **Hope is** the confident expectation of what God has promised to His people, and its' strength is in **His** faithfulness.

A few words from the Re-Gathering Team

Re-gathering Team: Linda Kusnierz, Ken Kinser, Marguerite Massey, Kathy Brewster The Re-Gathering Team met recently to discuss the March 4 Bishops Pastoral Letter with renewed Covid – 19 Guidelines as well as the follow up Zoom meetings with Clergy, Wardens and Parishioners. While St Anne's continues with remote worship indefinitely, we too are "cautiously hopeful" yet unable to determine at this time when it will be safe for all to resume in person worship. There remain many factors that are cause for concern and guidance from various sources that prevent us to recommend a safe re gathering at this time. We will meet again in early May to discuss and determine the conditions that need to be in place to recommend re-gathering in safety for all.

Also want to bring to your attention, the State has established a Home Bound Vaccination Program. The one shot J&J vaccine will be brought to and administered to the home bound resident. The program begins Monday March 29, should you know of anyone for whom this would be helpful the number to contact to schedule an appointment is: 1-844-771-1628 Monday – Friday 9 - 5.


Stay safe, continue to practice physical distancing, wash your hands frequently and wear your mask.

Have you received your vaccination? Interested in an appointment? Need help making an appointment? Need a ride to your appointment? Contact Linda Kusnierz or Marguerite Massey. Supply is on the increase; appointment availability is on the rise. Register now. See the recent Eligibility Status issued by the State. (Mass.gov Steps to get your Vaccination)



There are different ways to find a vaccine appointment:

- Preregister at <u>VaccineSignUp.mass.gov</u> to be notified when it's your turn to schedule an appointment at one of **7 mass vaccination locations**: Fenway Park, Gillette Stadium, Reggie Lewis Center, DoubleTree Hotel in Danvers, Eastfield Mall in Springfield, Natick Mall and former Circuit City in Dartmouth.
- Use <u>VaxFinder.mass.gov</u> to search for appointments at pharmacies, health care providers, and other community locations.

Massachusetts' preregistration system makes it easier to request and schedule an appointment at one of the 7 mass vaccination locations. People can preregister for a COVID-19 vaccine appointment at mass vaccination locations only. More locations will be added to the system in April.

Once you sign up for preregistration, you'll receive weekly status updates. You can opt out at any time if you find an appointment elsewhere. Once an appointment is available, you'll be contacted with the opportunity to book the appointment and have 24 hours to accept it.

Massachusetts receives a limited supply of COVID-19 vaccine doses from the federal government each week. Due to high demand and extremely limited supply, it may take several weeks to schedule an appointment or to be notified that an appointment is available at mass vaccination locations.

Any Billerica Resident who is Food insecure may receive, we all need a helping hand once in a while. Please register if you are in need, we are here for you. If you DON'T live in Billerica, we can help you find solutions, you are not alone.

For those wish to help with our wish list – we are looking for 300 sets. We are looking for a variety of sizes since families come in all shapes and sizes. Each family will 3- or 4-piece sets.







Spring is here - A time for new beginnings!

St. Anne's has identified the need for a comprehensive data-base system that will organize, maintain, and update the records of the Parish. Currently, our information has been stored on various computers, paper files, and personally owned computers. After much research and comparisons of information obtained from the Diocese and other parishes, St. Anne's has subscribed to Realm Connect. A monthly fee allows us to use the system, work with a dedicated Realm staff member to assist in the implementation, obtain unlimited technical support, and automatically update the software when available.

What is Realm? – Realm is an online ministry tool designed for real time connection. It helps our church connect with you and you connect with us. Realm allows you to manage your personal information and who is allowed to see it, control your giving, if you choose, and keep in touch with the groups that matter to you.

Why use Realm? – Realm helps us serve you better and leads this church well between Sundays. Everyone can be connected from anywhere at any time. It engages everyone in the life of our church by supporting relationships that are essential to our church's mission. We stay organized, and you will stay informed.

What about my privacy? Realm is safe, private, and secure. Your privacy is one of our greatest concerns. St. Anne's Realm is only made up of the people in our church; it is not like a social network that is open to everyone. Realm keeps your data safe and gives you control over what information you share and who can see it.

We will provide periodic updates as the implementation of Realm progresses. Hopefully, we will soon benefit from improvements and reliability in Parish communication.

Final Resolution from the 235th Diocesan Convention

The 235th Convention of the Diocese of Massachusetts had several resolutions. In previous newsletters I addressed the Declaration of a Climate Emergency from Bishop Curry. I also reviewed the approval of the 2021 Diocesan Budget. The resolution that I want to address in this newsletter is the creation of a Racial Justice Commission. Parishes are called to take a look at this broad topic and how this impacts each parish. Some churches were built with funds that benefited from the slave trade. Some of the oldest churches in our Diocese may have been built by slaves. Some churches may have old or new art work that is inappropriate to our racial views of today.

The vestry at St. Anne's is starting a discussion on the broad topic of racial injustice and what this means for us by viewing a video by Presiding Bishop Curry. We will also be reading and discussing a prayer that was written and distributed on the Diocese website. I will be writing more about this topic in the future. Russell Bent and I will be suggesting how to explore this topic within the vestry and how we may extend this discussion to interested members of the congregation. 



Question: "Where does the saying 'He is risen; He is risen, indeed' come from?"

Answer: A traditional <u>Easter</u> greeting in the Western church is the exclamation "He is risen!" and the traditional response is "He is risen, indeed!" The words are sometimes accompanied by the exchange of three kisses on alternate cheeks, depending on the church. In the Orthodox and Catholic churches, the greeting is called the "Paschal greeting" and is a very old custom.

The greeting is ultimately based on <u>Luke 24:34</u>. Translations throughout church history, from the <u>Latin Vulgate</u> (c. AD 400) to the <u>ESV</u> (2001) have translated this verse nearly identically: "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" (ESV). Exactly how the saying became a standard greeting in the church is not known, although there are various theories regarding how it came into common usage.

We do know that, at first, the greeting was more common in Eastern and Byzantine liturgies than in the Western church. There is a tradition in the <u>Eastern Orthodox Church</u> that the saying was made popular by <u>Mary Magdalene</u> when she supposedly addressed Emperor Tiberius in Rome with the words "Christ is risen."

Using this address should be more than an empty tradition. The words "He is risen!" remind us of the joyous news we celebrate at Easter, that Jesus' death was not in vain, and that He has the power to overcome death. Saying "He is risen!" allows us to share this incredible truth with each other. The resurrection of Christ gives us hope for salvation and for our own resurrection and eternal life.
