#### Dear Student,

In the church, we are still celebrating Easter. We celebrate until Pentecost. This year Pentecost is May 23. We meet Mary last month, just as she was finding out about being the mother of Jesus. We're skipping ahead to a story that happens after Easter, but before Pentecost. This story involves one of Jesus's closest friends, Peter. Peter was a disciple. A disciple is a person who follows a teacher. This person does what their teacher says to do. Jesus had 12 very close disciples. On Good Friday, some people who were very angry and full of hate killed Jesus. But on Easter Sunday, Jesus rose from the dead. For 50 days after this, Jesus walked around and joined in disciples in eating and talking. Before Peter meet Jesus, he was a fisherman. Peter is called Simon Peter because his name was Simon, but Jesus gave him the name Peter, which means rock.

In your bible, turn to the book of John (it is the 4<sup>th</sup> book in the New Testament, the forty-third book counting the Old Testament). Please read Chapter 21.

- I wonder if you have ever tried to do something for a long time without any success?
- I wonder if anyone helped you to be successful?
- I wonder how Peter felt seeing Jesus?
- I wonder if you've ever been so happy to see someone that you stopped what you were doing and ran to them?
- The disciples had seen Jesus die, and then they heard that He was alive. This is the third time that they have seen Him since He was raised from the dead. How do you think they felt?
- During Jesus's trial, Peter had denied that he was a follower of Jesus three times. Now Jesus asks Peter three times if he loves Him. Why do you think Peter felt bad?
- I wonder what Jesus meant when He told Peter "Feed my lambs" and "Take care of my sheep"?
- Who do you think Jesus's lambs are?
- I wonder if Peter did what Jesus told him to?
- I wonder if someone takes good care of you?
- I wonder if you know how to take good care of someone?

In the packet are some worksheets, a coloring page, a poster about how to take care of yourself, and fun crafts.

Play the card game, Go Fish. Five cards are dealt from a standard 52-card deck (54 Counting Jokers) to each player, or seven cards if there are three or fewer players. The remaining cards are shared between the players, usually spread out in a disorderly pile referred to as the "ocean" or "pool". The player whose turn it is to play asks another player for their cards of a particular face value. For example, Player A may ask, "Player B, do you have any threes?" Player A must have at least one card of the rank they requested. Player B must hand over all cards of that rank if possible. If they have none, Player B tells Player A to "go fish" (or just simply "fish"), and Player A draws a card from the pool and places it in their own hand. Then it is the next player's turn – unless the card Player A drew is the card they asked for, in which case they show it to the other players, and they get another turn. When any player at any time has four cards of one face value, it forms a book, and the cards must be placed face up in front of that player. Play proceeds to the left. When all sets of cards have been laid down in books, the game ends. The player with the most books wins.



Wash your hair often. Keep it neat by styling and brushing.




#### Exercise

Play outside as much as possible. Don't sit and play on the computer or watch TV too often.




#### Hygiene

Bath or shower and change underwear daily. Wash hands after visiting the toilet and before eating.





#### TO MAKE THE MOBILE


Print out the spiral mobile page onto thin card. (160gsm copy card is suitable)



Colour in the spiral, fish and the boat.



Carefully cut out the boat and the fish along the thicker outer line To cut the spiral, first cut around the outer edge then, following the





Fold up the centre 'glue' tab along the dotted line.



Glue the 'glue tab' to the *inside* of one side of the boat making sure it is centred and the fish are to the outside.

Glue on the other side of the boat to the back side of the first. The glue tab of the spiral will then be sandwiched in between.





Tie a length of thread around the centre of the two fish then fold and glue together back to back.

Punch a hole ● in the end of the spiral and tie on the fish leaving about 3cm/1" of thread between the spiral and the fish.

Punch a hole in the top centre of the boat (marked with a O) and tie on a length of thread to hang.



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
