From the Wardens

As I sit down to write this month's Warden's article for our newsletter, I am grateful that the latest heatwave of 2021 has broken. It is still rather humid, but thankfully, the temperature has moderated.

Why do I bring up a change in the weather? It is because we seem to be in a state of constant change. I think we can all agree that there is only one thing that has remained constant at St. Anne's and our world in general. What has been constant? In my opinion, only change has remained constant.

When thinking back over the last 16 or 17 months, a lot has changed:

- We had to close our doors to in person worship. However, we spent only one Sunday with no form of worship taking place on our alter. That was the very first Sunday, (March 15, 2020) when the pandemic was ramping up. Ironically, the Sunday prior to this (March 8) was the final Sunday that Fr. Brad was with us as our first Bridge Priest. As it turned out, March 8 was the final Sunday of in-person worship until the fall.
- We have established a new way to bring worship to our members and really anyone who would like to tune in and "participate" with us while worshiping virtually. The method by which we stream services has also changed tremendously since we began.
- At the beginning of the pandemic, St. Anne's had no clergy leading us in worship. We were extremely fortunate that Rev. Jonathan was willing to be our Priest for the beginning of virtual worship. In June of 2020, we were fortunate again to have hired Mother Jennifer as our second Bridge Priest.
- We re-opened our doors for in-person worship for several weeks in the fall as the numbers concerning the virus trended in a positive direction. But unfortunately, when the trends reversed, we closed again.

- The Vestry and Mother Jennifer agreed to a new Covenant of Ministry as the first ever Priest-In-Charge at St. Anne's.
- Vestry members and parishioners are taking on more leadership roles within our parish.
 Among the tasks underway is the addition of new technology to help us keep in touch with one another. By now, anyone with a known email address should have received an invitation to set up their account in Realm.
- Since the beginning of the pandemic, we have lost several members of our parish family. We already miss seeing their faces and hearing their voices, but we will always cherish the memories we have of each one of them.
- We have recently re-opened our doors for in-person worship. And we continue to provide our service virtually through the lens of two Point, Tilt, Zoom (PTZ) cameras and the self-trained "stream team". We could not have done this without them.

So, as I started, at St. Anne's, the only thing that has remained constant is change. I have outlined many changes and I probably missed several. Some change is good, and some is sad. As I look forward to the summer months, I hope that one thing that does not change is the enthusiasm that we are seeing from our parishioners to be back at church and take on new leadership roles. In the past, we wondered what the "new normal" will be like. I think it is here and I look forward to experiencing it with all of you.

Tuesday Morning Bible Study

This gathering at 10am on Tuesdays is a small group ministry in which we gather to study God's word and the elements of our faith in order to better understand God's wishes for us in our everyday lives.

We have just completed studying the Apostles' Creed and what it means to us with help from "Life Guide" booklets. We are taking a break for the Summer, resuming the first Tuesday in September. We will next be studying the Lord's Prayer.

It is inspiring to sit among folks sharing their experiences, examining their doubts, supporting each other, and reinforcing their faith. The group is open to anyone seeking good fellowship in an earnest wish to further their faith journey. If you would like to find out if it is what you are seeking then just come along and try it. You will find yourself welcome.

I just completed my first year of EfM. It was a wonderful opportunity to read and study with a small group of people from other parishes. In my first year I read the Old Testament while others in the group read the New Testament (year two), religious history (year three), philosophy (year four). Each group shared what they had read that week and we did a spiritual reflection as a group.

What is EfM you ask? It is a small spiritual community focused on studying your faith and exploring what the "priesthood [or ministry] of all believers" means to you as a layperson? EfM (Education for ministry) might be just the ticket! EfM is an ecumenical, Episcopal Church-affiliated program. The School of Theology of Sewanee: The University of the South has created this distance learning curriculum blending individual study, small group interaction, and worship. Thankfully, using Zoom has enabled us to have fruitful meetings throughout the pandemic and even brought some unexpected benefits of bringing people together from different locations in the area. As we recruit for the fall, we can say we are hopeful that conditions will permit us to mix in a few optional, in-person meetings, but it seems likely we will continue to use Zoom as well. A few words from the Re-Gathering Team

Re-gathering Team: Linda Kusnierz, Ken Kinser, Marguerite Massey, Kathy Brewster

The Re-Gathering Team met on June 30 to review our current in person worship protocols. Some adjustments are being made as we continue to see improved conditions in our community and more persons fully vaccinated. Billerica, as of the June 24 reporting, is now in the grey status designation with less than or equal to 10 total active cases in the last 14 days and a percent positivity of 0.47%. The percentage of those individuals fully vaccinated is 57%.

In Person Worship as of July 11

- 9:30 Morning Prayer Service will continue through the summer months.
- Filming will continue and will be available on YouTube, Facebook, and St. Anne's web site.
- Wearing of Masks will be optional. Please follow CDC recommendations for mask wearing. Masks are available at the entrance of the church.
- When singing, please wear a mask, if you are not wearing a mask, sing with your heart.
- Hand sanitizer will be available at the entrance of the church and in the pews for use.
- **Bulletins** will continue to be prepared in one format for the in-person service attendees and the online worshipers.
- All Pews will be available for seating. You are encouraged to observe physical distancing.
- A **collection plate** will be available for donations at the entrance of the church and on the organ.
- Following the conclusion of the of the postlude, the Ushers will indicate to the congregation to begin **exiting the church from the back pews first** and move down the rows to the front until all the congregants have exited.
- The church will continue to use the **disinfecting mister** following services.
- Holy Communion will resume on Sunday, Sept 5 beginning with distribution of individual selfcontained wine and wafer.

The team will meet again in early September as we continue moving towards better days in community together.



My custom regarding those who have died is to keep their names in our prayers for about three weeks after the funeral or burial.

Making Announcements

I like inviting individuals to stand and make announcements in the church because of the visibility that gives to all the members of the community. But, unfortunately, it does not work for our listeners at home. So, please write down your announcement and hand the piece of paper to me before the service starts. Or, send in your announcement to our church office before Wednesday evening for printing in the following Sunday's bulletin. Thank you.

Yet another busy month. We've had a few weeks of in-person worship complete and things are looking good. The church is set up so that aside from the cameras that are mounted in various locations you wouldn't know we have a full streaming setup going on. The Streaming Crew is now around the corner in the microphone room setting up camera

angles and making sure the sound is good. With the new network cable run into the room we can now broadcast to YouTube and Facebook at the same time. This allows everyone to watch the same service at the same time and removes the step of having to upload later on. With summer now started, work on an additional team has started and we'll spend the next few weeks with trainees looking over our shoulder to see what we're doing and eventually let them take over. To do this I've been frantically documenting the steps to put on a service and so far it's taken up much of a page – and that's only part of the detail.

On the technology side...we have a new copier. It doesn't sound like much but this one includes color. Those of you that get this mailed to you will see the pages like they were meant to be. Well not this page as it's all just text in black and white. But using color can make things look better. We were able to negotiate a good price for a new copier with the extra feature and in the long run it will save the office staff time and money.


Want to Join a Book Club?

Once the bulletins have been placed, I return to the office, freshly aware that mindful preparation is a type of prayer.


