

We were very pleased to host the celebration of life of our long-term Rector, Marguerite (Peggy) Howell. For those who are new to St. Anne's, Rev. Peggy served as our Rector from 1996 until she retired in 2014. We all miss her dearly as she meant so much to some many of us. Personally, for Sandra and I, she married us back in May of 2001. She made us feel so welcome at St. Anne's, we never left and have become involved more than we could have ever imagined. She will never be forgotten. It was certainly an honor for us to host this service for her family and closets friends. May she rest in peace.

In other news, as the weather cools, normally at St. Anne's we start a new program year. It's early October and I'm sure Brenda is hard at work coming up with an interesting and educational curriculum for the 21-22 church school year. And thank you to all of those who visited and spent some time at the St. Anne's booth at Billerica's annual Yankee Doodle weekend on Saturday, September 18. The weather cooperated and we could tell that many people were quite pleased to be out and about with things getting back to some sense of "normal".

Our doors remain open for in person worship even as the Covid-19 numbers aren't getting much better. We have also resumed offering a weekly Eucharist service, although the way we all receive communion is quite different. If you have been away from church for a while, please know that we continue to strive to keep everyone as safe as possible. The Eucharist is now offered in plastic individually sealed cups to reduce contact. We are also continuing to wear masks while indoors, and we're practicing physical distancing by household while in church.

In addition, we continue to record and live stream our Sunday service. Anyone with internet access can watch our Sunday service live on YouTube, Facebook and we'll be back on Billerica Access Television (BATV) soon. There are several ways to stay in touch with YOUR spiritual home. Traditionally this time of year is when we welcome back to church those who may have taken some time away for the summer. But this year, we welcome everyone back to Church and the Eucharist whether you're coming to the building or watching online.... Either way, please note that beginning in October, our Sunday service will begin at 9:00 am. Please continue to worship with us whichever way you are most comfortable.

Just a quick update on the single serve communion. We will be continuing with the single serve communion for as long as the diocese requires it. The altar guild worked hard to find the chalice design with wine. The first order has been consumed so we ordered more. This is without a doubt the best available, and therefore, is back-ordered. If you were in church this weekend, you might have celebrated with the cup style containing juice and a gluten free wafer. We ordered the gluten free to allow all of Rev Peggy's family to receive communion at her memorial service. Please let us know if you are gluten free, and we will order a small amount for you. Everyone should be able to receive if they wish. That being said, unless requested we will not be ordering that variety again. We have ordered some cups with the "typical" wafer to get Saint Anne's through until the preferred chalice and wine comes in (yes, we had to order communion through Amazon). The preferred chalice wafer and wine should be received by the end if October. Thank you for your support and patience as we navigate the pandemic supply issues. Suggestions are always welcome.




In-person lessons will require wearing masks due to the pandemic. If you are interested in assisting with in-person lessons, please let Brenda know.


Our next lesson is the Dove.

In our last newsletter, we mentioned how Realm can alternatively be used to do your 2022 pledge. We plan on having that as a pledging option later on this Fall.

Another feature of Realm that we would like to introduce is its online, donation feature. You access it after you log into your Realm account, and landing on the Giving page. There you will see the option to give (+Give), which brings you to the online Giving page. As you can see, you can donate for an offering, flowers, or a memorial remembrance, with options of one-time, or multiple, on a certain date, and add a small memo.



On your mobile phone, once you install the Realm application, you click on the Giving button at the bottom of your screen, select 'Make a Gift', and then select what type of donation you would like to make.



My roller coaster ride with the Covid pandemic through the open church doors of St. Anne's Church. By Yvonne Hopkins

The first time on a ride was with my mom at Revere Beach in MA. It was a beautiful beach day and aunts from Maine were visiting my Grandparents. The three sisters were always adventurous, and they drove in their cars and trucks so transportation for my mom (who didn't drive) was available for them. I was tall enough to the ride the Roller Coaster, Yea!

My first ride brought on anxiety & fear of the unknown. Waiting for our turn to ride, I prayed one Hail Mary and the Lord's Prayer quietly in French.

Our turn came and we were strapped in and a bar came down in front of us. We could put hands on the bar but not push the bar forward. As we climbed slowly to the top, it was beautiful to see the Ocean, the sand and how small people appeared to be. With the height at the top, could I touch God in Heaven?

Mom said, "scream when you go down", Vonnie – the only name anyone used for me at the time. My stomach had butterfly feelings throughout the ride. I enjoyed it!

The ride with the Covid pandemic all around me brought feelings of isolation, loneliness, anger and the loss of many beautiful, loving and caring people in our church, our country and around the world.

I have lived my life and been blessed with beautiful children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. A husband who shopped for food, meds, gifts, and mailed packages to keep me safe from Covid. The church doors and the Thrift Shop, with its outreach to the community, were all closed.

The world was different, and I was different. Reaching out for help was difficult. I come from an era of "Pull yourself out it". I was deeply concerned not only for my family and children but for all the precious children of the world. Young children today are tech-savvy, have compassion for each other and start out blind to ethnicity, religious differences and gender issues and I have learned to appreciate all of them. They are the future and I believe our Lord is guiding them. I've written down my anger, prayed over it, shred it and threw it away. My tears are tears of Joy now with humor and love. I still have some frustration with my iPhone (poor Michael) and the techy stuff.

My ability to get over that last steep climb on the roller coaster was due to St. Anne's: Church service videos on YouTube and Mother Jennifer – thank you for being there and getting us through the pandemic with words of comfort and joy with a smile, with the Lord's words of Praise and Prayer on Sunday, at meetings or through messages or texts.

The doors were physically closed, but not the Church. Every Sunday I was in church with the videos, music, solo singing, and lit candles. Pictures of the Good Shepherd, the Descending Dove, the hanging cross, and more. I prayed and looked forward to the day I would be in church with my brothers and sisters in communion at St. Anne's. I'm still working on the feelings.

St. Anne's community through Tuesday bible study groups, our Bishops encouraging words and prays for all of us and the world have given me hope to remember we have free will and that God love's us more than we can understand.

The Re-Gathering Team continues meeting to examine and discuss available information from our Diocese and local government. We review the latest trends and recommendations of possible strategies that we may employ to reduce the effects of the ever-changing pandemic. These meetings always start and end with prayer and we will continue to pray for God's protective and healing hand to touch not only St. Anne's immediate family, but also for our world-wide family.

Some of our time is spent examining data such as local per centages of vaccinations and rates of positive test results. We also discuss personal restrictions such as mask requirements and physical distancing that we may recommend or implement in an effort to keep us safe. There are always comments about what we are missing. There are even a few times, not many, when we collectively indulge in a Team "Pity Party" of what we have been forced to give up and how much we wished things could be back to normal. We are always aware that sometimes we just have to put numbers in the back of our mind and concentrate on what is really important to us, enabling and enhancing our ability to have fellowship and worship together.

Some personal thoughts. Recently, there have been some significant changes in our Worship Service. We have progressed form Morning Prayer to The Holy Eucharist. With modifications, we are back to the service that many of us have longed for. Even though I personally prefer a spontaneous prayer, I didn't realize how much I missed the traditional prayers said in unison by the congregation as written for us. We are wearing masks, but, we can sing as soft or as loud as we choose to fully be a part of the Service. We are able to partake in the Holy Eucharist, although the method of delivery has changed, the gift, meaning and symbolism remains unchanged. If you haven't attended recently in person or on-line, please join us.

The Re-Gathering Team will continue to meet so that hopefully, at the earliest possible time, we may completely return to life as normal at St. Anne's.





Jennifer's Journal

Recently in church, we heard the following Collect of the Day.

"O God, For as much as without you we are not able to please you, mercifully grant that your Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen."

This prayer was my grandmother's favorite table grace. I heard it prayed many times throughout my childhood. I have loved and remembered this prayer for many decades. Perhaps its appeal to me is the stark nature of its truths. It says, so plainly, these four things:

- 1. Without God in my life, I can't be sure of anything I do
- 2. God gives with mercy
- 3. The Holy Spirit knows how to direct and rule in all of me
- 4. Ruling my heart yeah, that's where life is at

What do you think of it? Can you see using it as a daily prayer, or, perhaps, even as a table grace? Try it. Enjoy it. What other prayers have you loved? I'd love to hear.

The 236th Diocesan Convention of the Diocese of Massachusetts will meet November 12-13, 2021. There will be four Resolutions put before us for which St. Anne's delegates will need to vote. Our five delegates (only two of whom will actually vote) have begun considering the Resolutions, and they would like to hear your opinions.

Resolution One. A Call to include and enter Barbara Clementine Harris in the Calendar of the Church Year. This will need to be voted by two consecutive conventions.

Resolution Two. A Call to carbon drawdown. This encourages not just a carbon zero footprint, but a carbon negative footprint, which means efforts toward removing carbon from one's community (all by natural means, such as planting trees).

Resolution Three. Burying the dead: A Resolution to Encourage Sustainable Christian Death Practices. This resolution educates more than it recommends any particular practice.

Resolution Four. Charting the Long Road towards Reparations. Put forward by the newly established Racial Justice Commission, this resolution gives a plan forward for our Diocesan response to racial inequities in our current and our historical life. Toolkits and audits will become available this year for use in parishes to learn more about the issues. The resolution attempts a balance between voices saying 'not enough' and voices saying 'too much'. It sets 2024 as the year for our Diocesan structure to begin paying some form of restitution and reparation. To whom and how much are very much the questions meant to be discussed and decided as, together, we chart the long road forward.

At a Diocesan open comment session, I suggested our own Vestry Subcommittee's foundation for considering the radical concept of reparations: "Because we all have a responsibility to do justice". This was affirmed in the session, and someone responded with Isabel Wilkerson's analogy in her book Caste. "If one were to buy a house that is 150 years old and the wiring had never been updated, one would fix it." I find this an interesting way to look at the idea of reparations. I invite you in to this difficult, challenging, and seemingly irrelevant conversation.



Preparing for Rev. Peggy's memorial service delighted me with so many offers and ideas for doing this together. You all pitched in and made it our celebration of the gifts she gave us. Thank you for lifting up Rev. Peggy's memory among us.

Sunday morning worship will begin at 9:00am, starting October 3rd. After many conversations, the service start time that is fair to both of our previously separate congregations of 8:00 and 10:00 services is the 9:00 hour exactly in the middle. We will see how this goes, as everyone adjusts to a shift.

We now have gluten-free communion wafers. Please don't hesitate to ask for it. Let me know any other comments you may have about communion during Covid.

Do you have thoughts about Advent and Christmas this year, our second year of being affected by the pandemic? Please speak up.




