




There is a bin in the hallway or the narthex on Sundays to receive your donations. If you prefer to make a cash donation please let me know and I can make purchases in your name.




Cursillo Update

We'll be having a budget committee meeting in the next couple of months to come up with a budget for 2022, and any information we can get prior to the meeting regarding pledges will be greatly appreciated.



Speaking of Stewardship, the Thrift Shop has been doing a great job. It makes up a considerable percentage of our income at St. Anne's. Looking back over the last 5 years, it has accounted for 22% of our income in 2020 (pandemic year) and 31% back in 2016. Over the last 5 years its average contribution has been 26% of our income, and it's looking to be higher than that for 2021.

Congratulations, and thanks to all who have worked so hard to keep it going—but it's going to need more help moving forward. Keeping it in operation is not only a benefit to the church's financial health, it is a service to the community at large.



The Small but Mighty church of St Anne's has again chosen to support the House of Hope as the recipient of our 2021 Angel Tree efforts. I am asking us all to take a step back and consider how fortunate we are to have a community that supports us and acknowledge that others are not as fortunate.



For those not familiar with House of Hope: located in Lowell, this organization is dedicated to individuals and families who are housing / shelter insecure. They help with transitioning into stable housing options through support, healing and education, in order to build economic sufficiency to support a stable home life. House of Hope in our local area can handle 58 families and up to 200 homeless individuals each night.

In speaking with our contact, I learned that they would prefer that we purchase the items they have listed on their online wish list (thanks Covid) and have the items delivered directly to their home-base. I am asking St Anne's to again be generous in their support of the Angel Tree efforts. Our admins of Realm will be setting up an Angel Tree giving option within Realm

to make giving easy. If you prefer the cash method, please feel free to see me after church, or leave an envelope for me in the donation basket (please mark it as Angel Tree). Also this year, a young assistant, Ms. Emma Baldwin, will be helping choose the gifts we purchase.

The climate crisis, racial justice and a renewed mission strategy are at the top of the agenda, as the annual Diocesan Convention prepares to gather next month, deliberating under the theme "Members One of Another" taken from Romans 12:5 and an invitation to celebrate and explore interdependence as members of the Body of Christ. With COVID-19 precautions still in play, the Nov. 12-13 event will take place fully online again this year.

The virtual format makes it possible to open Friday's full line-up of learning sessions and worship to anyone who would like to participate. (See the following page for a list of sessions and programs.)

Convention's annual business sessions follow on Saturday. Delegates and clergy will participate via Zoom, with a livestream available for those who wish to observe the proceedings.

(All convention Zoom sessions and the Saturday livestream will be presented via a virtual event management platform, so pre-registration will be necessary to access them. **You can register through the website listed above.**)

- Resolutions that will be voted on include those for carbon drawdown commitments and the embrace of
 sustainable burial practices, as well as accountability and action on the diocesan commitment to
 repentance and reparations for the sin and legacy of slavery, including the creation by 2024 of a
 diocesan reparations fund.
- The convention will also vote on a request to the 80th Episcopal Church General Convention in 2022 to add the late Rt. Rev. Barbara C. Harris, first female bishop in the worldwide Anglican Communion, to the church calendar for commemoration on March 13
- There will also be a revised mission strategy proposal (the current strategy was adopted in 2016). The
 proposed revision draws on the core themes of discipleship, justice seeking and care for creation that
 emerged from survey and conversation responses collected from congregations and groups earlier this
 year by the Mission Strategy Committee of Diocesan Council.
- Finally, Convention will vote on the proposed \$9.4-million diocesan budget for 2022.

Remarks from Bishop Alan M. Gates

Excerpt from remarks made at the Episcopal City Mission 177th Annual Meeting, October 16, 2021:

Among the books I read during my sabbatical was the latest offering from our colleague and friend, the Rev. Canon Stephanie Spellers. On Tuesday of this week, Canon Spellers joined clergy of our diocese to share wisdom from her book, *The Church Cracked Open: Disruption, Decline and New Hope for Beloved Community.* She reflects on the COVID-19 pandemic, racial reckoning and the immense transformations taking place within the church. Like the alabaster jar cracked open by a woman in Bethany in order to anoint Jesus with its oil, the church – says Stephanie – is a vessel bearing a precious gift of grace; however, for that grace to be extended, for the vessel to fulfill its purpose, it will have to be cracked open. Things that may define what we think it means to be intact or complete will have to be set aside, even shattered, in order to fulfill our truest calling as agents of God's love.

Individually and collectively, this is hard. For some of us, perhaps, excruciating. Commenting upon the passage we heard in last Sunday's gospel, Stephanie says this:

[The rich young man] did not know how to survive without his possessions and position, not just because of greed, but because they defined him. Jesus offered to train him out of ... self-seeking behaviors, toward self-giving and self-emptying. The young man did not want that freedom or ultimately that joy. Most human beings don't [But] Beloved community is the community animated by this non-clinging, self-emptying, persistent love. ... [A]s the individual and the collective strive and sacrifice for the sake of the flourishing of the greater whole, and for the end of all forms of domination and oppression that diminish the children of God ... God's creation [becomes] a community of love.²

All of this, of course, connects with why we are here today. Episcopal City Mission, the Diocesan Racial Justice Commission, the Creation Care Justice Network, our two dioceses in the Commonwealth, and all Christians

are called to this all-encompassing and transformative journey: giving our hearts, minds and whole selves to God.


