### *Suggestions for reflection upon your gift of stewardship during Lent!*

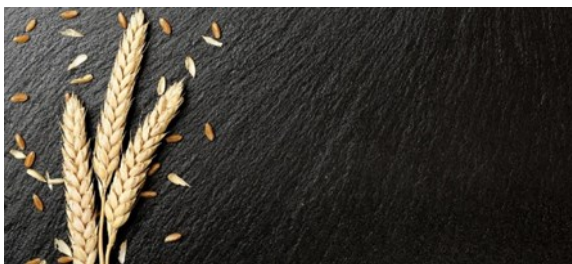
**Time** – Spring cleaning is a time to do some dusting inside or garden clean-up of outside church property;

## Social Justice Meeting

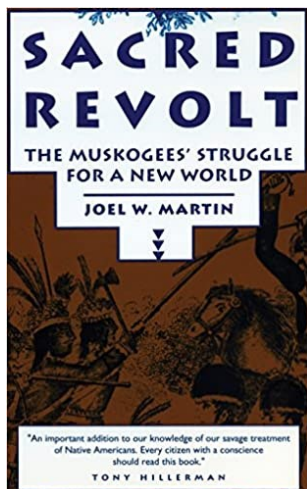
**March 22**

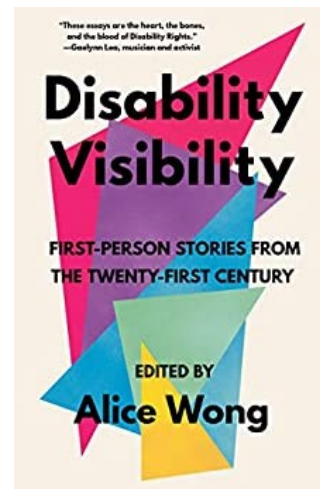

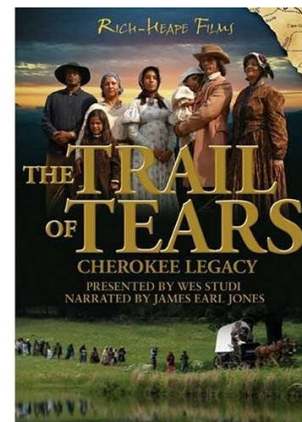

### From St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Port Royal, VA

As I was looking for information about a contemporary language Great Litany, that we will use on March 5<sup>th</sup>, I found the website of this large church. I liked the following historical description of Lent, so thought I would pass it on to you here in our Newsletter.

Facts about Lent – by Dr. Richard P. Bucher <https://www.churchsp.org/factsaboutlent2020/>

- What we now call Lent was originally a period of fasting and study for catechumens who were to be baptized on the Saturday before Easter. The 40 day fast was said by Athanasius in 339 AD to be celebrated the world over. The 40 day fast of Jesus in the wilderness was responsible for the number 40 being chosen.
- The purpose of this extended fast was to practice self-denial and humility. This was to prepare oneself for receiving God's grace and forgiveness in baptism, given on Easter Saturday or Easter Sunday.

## Remembering Bishop Barbara C. Harris

March 13, 2022, will mark the two-year anniversary of the death of Bishop Barbara C. Harris, first female bishop in the Anglican Communion and former suffragan (assisting) bishop of the Diocese of Massachusetts. Prior to being part of the first wave of women to be ordained priest in the Episcopal Church, she was a well-known advocate for social justice and active in the civil rights movement. She retired in 2002 but continued to offer her stories, wisdom, presence, and example. She published two books: the sermon collection *Parting Words: A Farewell Discourse*, in 2003, and *Hallelujah, Anyhow! A Memoir*, in 2018.

Episcopal dioceses across the country, including the Diocese of Massachusetts, are growing a movement to add Bishop Barbara Harris to the Episcopal Church's calendar of Lesser Feasts and Fasts, which would make her a saint of the Episcopal Church, with her feast day celebrated on March 13. Resolutions are to come before the 80<sup>th</sup> General Convention in July 2022.

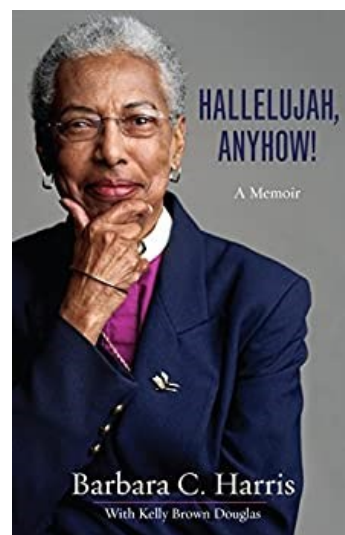

*Everliving God, in every generation you cause fresh winds to renew, refresh, and refine your people and in your Word summon us to live courageously as Easter people in an often Good Friday world. Defend us in our own day to make no peace with oppression; that boldly following the example of your servant Barbara Clementine Harris, chosen bishop in your church, we may strive not for ease or fame but gladly toil and walk with you all along our pilgrim journey; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.*

## From the Desk of the Parish Administrator

A part of my work that I haven't mentioned much here is my "other job" at a United Methodist church in Melrose. I spend more time in that office than I do at St. Anne's, even though the Episcopal Church is my "home church" and I am just a guest contributor in the United Methodist Church. I have learned a lot about the UMC through my work there. I have also had the chance to observe similarities and differences that arise while carrying out my responsibilities, and I thought it would be interesting to share some of my observations.



One difference I have observed stems from the different governing structures and methods of the Episcopal Church and the United Methodist Church. I am only one person, so take this as a personal observation only, but there is often a lot more flexibility in the UMC in terms of who gets to do what, and how. At the United Methodist church where I work, I have a dual role as both office administrator and children's and youth minister. On weekdays, I am in the office, and on Sunday mornings, I am often in the pulpit or holding the microphone, delivering a children's sermon, or reading the day's Scripture passage.

My first thought upon being offered both positions was that this is a confusion of roles. The Episcopal Church has taught me that one must never mix

administrative work and pastoral care for the same congregation. There are indeed times when I feel awkward. Yet, this is how this church does things, and perhaps there is something to be learned. Some weeks, I write prayers for the Sunday service, design and print the bulletins, and then lead the congregation in saying those prayers during the service. (The UMC is a liturgical church but allows more flexibility in the form of each week's liturgy, since they do not use a Book of Common Prayer as we do. There is an order of worship to be used as a guideline, but it does not include specific page numbers!)

Although I have a different set of duties at my "other job," there are more similarities than differences (John and Charles Wesley, the founders of Methodism, were Anglicans, after all). Working in two church offices simultaneously has helped me to learn more quickly how to be an effective administrator, since many tasks are the same throughout the year. The only major difference in timing so far has been that the Methodist church holds its church conference in November, whereas the St. Anne's annual meeting is in January or February (given the enormous amounts of work involved in both, I am grateful for this!). Often a reminder to complete a task in one church—such as purchase seasonal stationery or make sure we have order forms for flowers—also serves as a reminder to do that same thing in the other church.

This is especially helpful as I revise the organizational systems passed down to me from previous administrators, to better suit my personal style and the needs of each church.

I hope these observations are somewhat interesting. If so, I will continue to share them in future newsletters.

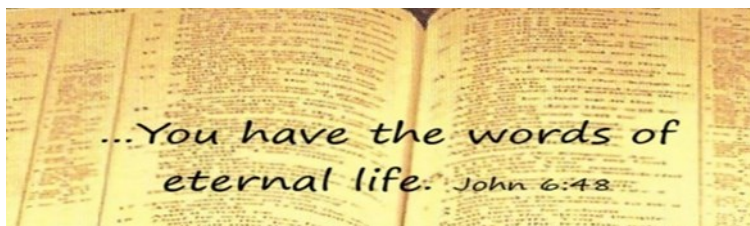


## St. Anne's Prayer List
