This program will be led by Ron Desmarais. It is based on the Catechesis








Movie Night

June 12 set for diocesan service to celebrate life of Barbara C. Harris: Planning is now underway for a diocesan liturgy in celebration of the life of Bishop Barbara C. Harris, to be held at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston on Sunday, June 12 at 5 p.m. This celebration, long delayed because of the pandemic, will include a memorial service of Holy Eucharist and will be open to the diocesan community for in-person attendance. The service also will be available to the wider church community by livestream via the cathedral church's website at www.stpaulboston.org. Please save the date and watch for details in the weeks ahead.

I'm excited to attend, at the end of April, the annual Diocesan Clergy Conference. We will be considering the topic of theology in the parish – ups and downs, faith and unbelief, skepticism and joy. I also look forward to worshipping God together, and renewing three years' worth of absence from each other.

The Co-Wardens and I have worked out the Sundays when I will be away from you July through October 2022. We coordinated the recommendations of our *Covid Respite Committee* (requested by the Diocese), my July attendance at *General Convention* on behalf of Province One (I am on the Executive Committee for that body that represents all 7 of the Episcopal Dioceses in New England: MA, Western MA, RI, CT, VT, NH, and ME), my *vacation*, and my continuing education *Pilgrimage* to the Holy Land in October with our Suffragan Bishop Gayle Harris.

St. Anne's Social Conscience Committee meets monthly to thoughtfully consider how St. Anne's engages faith with the world's challenges. They offer book discussions after church, movie viewing and conversation, and personal story sharing. To the Diocesan call for feedback about the topic of reparations, the four committee members will attend virtual meetings this month, as well as receive the co-chair of the Diocesan Racial Justice Commission for two sessions with her in June. I look forward to St. Anne's contributions to the wider diocesan discussions.

Just after Easter, during the middle of the month of Ramadan, our Abrahamic faith siblings at the Dawoodi Bohra Mujid on Rangeway Rd invited community members and government officials to an Iftar. Three of us from St. Anne's were honored to attend an evening of listening and learning, prayers, and dinner. Ask Maria Martin about the tasty food. Ask Sandra Giroux about their community contributions, especially the one on May 7th. We all were honored to hear from the United States Attorney Rachael Rollins, especially when we learned that this community was her first public visit since the death threats she received after her US Congressional confirmation hearings. It was a privilege to hear her support the future work of her predecessor's relationship with our local Muslim congregation. Worldwide, the 1 million members of Dawoodi Bohra contribute to the communities they live in. Over and over we heard that message. Again and again, our local leaders Fatema and Taher bring community needs to the attention of the Billerica Interfaith Association and our Community Pantry. We are blessed by their presence among us.

Our friends at the Dawoodi Bohra Anjuman-e-Ezzi Masjid in Billerica invited a very small group (due to Covid protocols) to participate in their lftar imparting a multi faith message; we all want peace and unity.

By participating I learned so much about my InterFaith neighbors and I wanted to share.

What is a Iftar?

I was unfamiliar with the term so I did what most of us do; I googled...

Fasting is one of the five pillars of the Islamic faith, and during the Islamic holy month of Ramadan Muslims fast every day from Sunrise to Sunset. The pre-dawn meal is called Suhoor and the fast breaking sunset meal is called an Iftar and takes place after evening prayer.

For the Dawoodi Bohras (this particular sect) as for many Muslims throughout the world, the masjid (mosque) is the center of their community, as St. Anne's is for us. A place for the community to gather for prayer, spiritual guidance, education and socializing – the masjid is the heart, and without a heart one can not thrive.

Worldwide, Bohras believe that nobody should go to bed hungry; they regularly organize food drives to feed the food insecure. (See the information on the Project Rise special distribution 5/7.)

Being a Bohras comes with social responsibility: taking care of those in need – particularly the homeless, the hungry, and the sick. Bohras take time and effort to help those less fortunate than themselves. Sound familiar? Bohras also feel each and everyone has a duty to care for the environment and all who live here, all creatures large and small.

I do hope once Covid protocols are lifted you are able to meet my friends.

After leaving the Iftar I felt it necessary to send a Thank you note, for the experience touched me. I had such a peaceful feeling.

I wanted to share a portion of my note:

"Thank you so much for welcoming us to share your celebration. You have such a vibrant and welcoming community. To me if felt like I was catching up with friends vs. meeting new people for the first time."

What is "Social Conscience"?

For the past month or so, St. Anne's Social Justice Committee has been discussing the relevant term known as "Social Conscience."

The Dictionary meaning for Social Conscience states that: "A social conscience is a sense of responsibility or concern for the problems and injustices of society." This is a broad interpretation, for people may have their own perception of societal struggles and personal obligations towards them.

For example, many Polish citizens have actively worked helping the millions of Ukrainian refugees pouring into their country after the Russian invasion. They have collected food, offered both physical and emotional support, and even opened their houses to these desperate people. Therefore, these people have activated their own sense of social conscience. Their "conscience" has perceived a great societal wrong, and they have put these feelings into action.

Conversely, many citizens perceive the rising amounts of immigrants as a social "problem." These people worry about the burden these refugees have placed on the Polish economic, financial, and societal structure.

Now, the Episcopalian Diocese has asked St. Anne's parish members to discuss and share viewpoints on the subject of "Reconciliation." The following passage reflects the Diocesan position on this matter:

Often topical issues cause people to "churn the waters." However, both the Diocese and St. Anne's would prefer people to discuss these topics in a calm, polite environment. Therefore, St. Anne's values your thoughts and opinions on social conscience and how it reflects on the subject of "reconciliation."

Give us new hearts to recognize the brokenness in our communities and to heal the wounds we have inflicted.


Give us new hands to serve the earth and its people and to shape beloved community.

From the Desk of the Parish Administrator

Now that extra busy season in the church office (the lead-up to Easter Sunday) has passed, I have a moment to think again! I have been reflecting on different aspects of my role as parish administrator, particularly the parts that I wouldn't have guessed were part of the job before I began it. One very surprising thing is that most of my job as administrator involves making decisions and judgment calls. I spend much more of my time doing this than I spend on more routine tasks such as copying and pasting announcements and prayers, or printing flyers and schedules.

I am often the first contact that an individual makes when they are trying to reach St. Anne's. The church email, which I use and check, is on our website, so anyone in the world could potentially send us an email, which I would then be the first person to read. I do regularly get assorted emails from people I haven't had prior contact with, and I have to decide whether it's spam or phishing (we still get too many of these), a question I can answer quickly with a piece of information, or something I will

need to pass on to a particular person (usually Mother Jennifer). I always want to make the right choice for what to do with each email, and I think I do a good job, but it does take effort and experience! The longer I am in this job, the more I learn what constitutes a good judgment call.
