

Dear Parish of St. Anne's,


It is with appreciation yet sadness that we say goodbye to our Parish Administrator, Jayleigh Lewis. She came into our life a year into the pandemic when all was in chaos. Jayleigh has brought order to our Office and our administration as she graciously worked with many of us to sort and organize materials upended by floods and newly organized into computers and our Realm database. Jayleigh has worked miracles for us all. We will miss her.

But, this smooth partnering is coming to an end, only because she found a full-time position very near her home. At last, she will have benefits and a short commute. We wish we could have offered her those advantages. Because of her continued Sunday morning responsibilities in her new parish, Jayleigh will be unable to join us for a coffee hour. Instead, could you please send cards to her directly (at our post office box), stop in to see her (she always includes her office hours in the Sunday bulletin), and send a donation for her to the Wardens or me, if you wish. We wish her well, and I hope she comes back to see us!

I have now returned home from my pilgrimage of two weeks in Israel. Above is Bethlehem. The place where we Christians say God's Son was born. It's a place where many have lived and traveled and loved and fought. So many people care passionately about this place!

My day in Bethlehem began in Beit Sahur, in the lower right corner of the mosaic above, at The Shepherds' Fields (1). This is a natural field preserved for pilgrims and worshipers and tourists. Constantly, we were reminded that the scale is small in that land where every inch has had important events. These fields are tiny! And look at how stony all the land is.

Most of the stone everywhere in Israel is limestone, of different colors. The pieces in the mosaic are probably just 10-15 colors of eastern Mediterranean limestone. This made long-lasting mosaics, such as ones I saw in a Roman excavation.

From Beit Sahur, we looked across a valley to Bethlehem (2) with settlement housing on the hillside, and over a souvenir shop across another valley to Jerusalem (3) only 7 miles to the north.

One of the qualities in this land that impressed me is the jumble of cultures and peoples. This gateway to a coffee shop (4) shows you how many languages live next to each other: Spanish, English, and Arabic. I learned that spelling in English is not standardized; therefore, everyone is welcome to speak and write. It meant that, no matter who or how foreign I am, I am welcome there, even in people's homes and hearts.

This quality of radical welcome sits strangely amidst the hospitality embedded in both Hebrew and Palestinian cultures. Therefore, it was heartbreaking to see the following story written on a large poster hanging on the border wall in Bethlehem confining it within the West Bank.

This is the story written in the photograph (5).

"Magical. Each Christmas the good tidings to the shepherds are commemorated at the Shepherds' Fields in Beit Sahour. As a child it was magical for me. I remember the candle light processions to the Shepherd Fields in the middle of the night. There we sang, prayed, ate together and made a big fire. Afterwards we attended mass in the church and had breakfast with chocolate and wine. We visited our family and friends to wish each other Merry Christmas. There was no Wall and no checkpoint. No one would say: "You are not allowed to enter this place." Things could not be more different now!"

Inside the oldest church with continuous worship in all of Christendom, Lucy-Anne Hunt writes that the 12th century mosaics were crafted by local, indigenous artists at the direction of and collaboration between the Byzantine emperor from Constantinople, the King of Jerusalem, and the Latin Church.

Along the middle of the long wall (6), separated by acanthus leaves, are tributes to seven ecumenical councils (Nicaea, 325; Constantinople, 381; Ephesus, 431, Chalcedon, 451: Constantinople II, 553; Constantinople III, 680; Nicaea II, 787), four "provincial councils" (Antioch, 272; Ancira, 314: Sardi, 347; Gangra, around 340), and two local synods (Cartagine, 254; Laodicea, fourth century).

Every council is represented by a sacred building and is illustrated with a parchment upon which is written the exact decision taken at that time to define the humanity and divinity of Christ. https://holylandpilgrimages.org/the-mosaics-of-the-basilica-of-the-nativity/

I have never seen such a desire to teach the faithful about every single church council's theological decision (7)! I guess it makes sense to do so in the church celebrating His birth!

I leave you standing at the back of the church I have just entered (8). You see all the different peoples waiting their long turn to go down below in to the grotto where Jesus was born. This is the church that that has loved the baby, the man, and the Son of God.


This Advent Season, let us all journey together toward that place of radical homecoming. I am glad to be home among you, St. Anne's.



Let's begin this Advent season by looking at the virtue of Hope!

Racial Equity Diversity and Inclusion (REDI): The diocesan Racial Justice Commission invites all people in the diocese to take part in a (REDI) Assessment. It is an online survey that takes 30-35 minutes to complete. As we approach Advent, the beginning of our church year, the Racial Justice Commission hopes that the REDI survey provides "an opportunity to pause and reflect on how we are living into our mission as Christians," Leaders within the parishes are being asked to participate and all parishioners are welcome to take the survey. REDI survey results are confidential and are reported only in the aggregate. This assessment will be used as a baseline in 2022 and can be taken again in the future to measure progress toward race equity goals. The survey link is posted at www.diomass.org/REDI-

Building & Grounds Committee: This is a very active group of individuals working to provide an environment that is safe and meets the needs of our parish. Some of their projects include the following: Thrift Shop repairs, railing & columbarium installation, updating thermostats, and establishing a seasonal tickler file.



Jennifer's Journal December 2022

Advent arrives in the church year on Sunday, November 27. We will change to Year A in the lectionary readings, change to the royal color purple, begin singing the Sanctus and Fraction, singing no hymns at communion to promote calming meditative quiet, and new Prayers of the People and Eucharistic Prayer. It is a grand welcome to a new year, to beginning the cycle from birth to death all over again. If you want conversation about having an advent wreath in your home, please say so.



On FB Live, I will again offer my home ritual of Lighting my Advent Wreath with poetry, song, and prose. This year, I will offer it once a week on **Tuesdays at 8pm**.

St. Anne's Christmas Fair and concert will include my trio of cellos with myself, my husband, and neighbor. We have been practicing for a while and greatly look forward to this opportunity to persuade you that the cello is the most beautiful instrument in the world ©

Our Two Christmas Services will be at 1:00pm (followed by a Silver Tea) and at 8:00pm with candles. There will be special music at both services.

Funeral Ministry at St. Anne's. When a funeral comes up in the life of our parish (about every two or three months), I would like to have a few volunteers I could call. 
