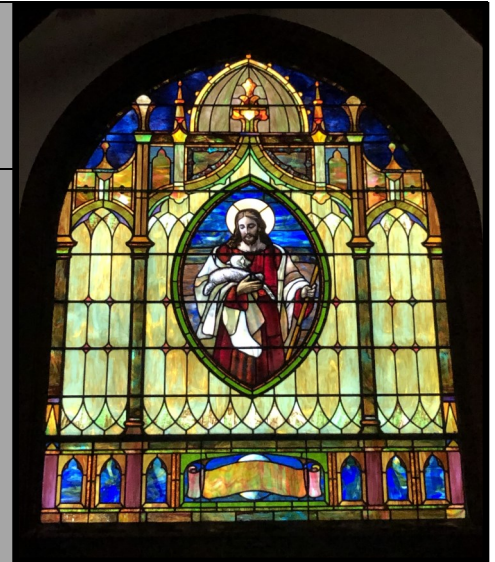

Also, for the Kaleidoscope Arts After-School program at St. John's, Lowell. Does St. Anne's want to request a Grant for a ministry we might dream of now? 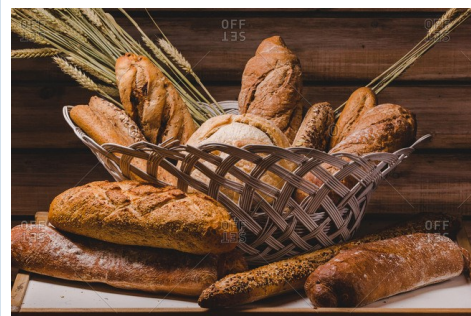

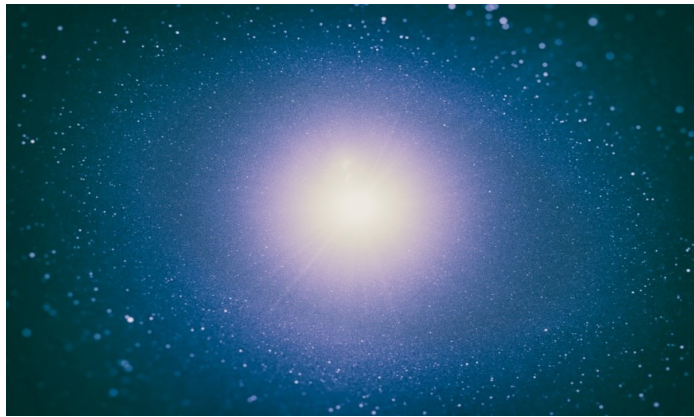

A Note on Music...



A Note on Music...

Following is the hymn story for “Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee” (H376) that we sang in the 9/10 service! The hymn story was written by Robert J. Morgan, and is from his book “Then Sings My Soul” (Book 1). A quote from Robert... “Hymns give us a way of talking to ourselves, of encouraging ourselves in the Lord, as we do when we sing *Be still my soul, the Lord is on thy side.*”

Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee

1907

For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the LORD, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope. Jeremiah 29:11

Once when recovering from a bout of depression, I found this hymn very therapeutic. “Melt the clouds of sin and sadness, drive the dark of doubt away,” it says. “Giver of immortal gladness, fill us (me) with the light of day.” Notice how every phrase of this prayer is bursting with exuberance: The Lord is our “wellspring of the joy of living,” our “ocean depth of happy rest,” and we ask Him to, “Lift us to the joy divine.”

The author of the hymn, Henry Jackson van Dyke, was born in Pennsylvania in 1852, and became pastor of the Brick Presbyterian Church in New York City.* Henry later became professor of English literature at Princeton, and the author of a number of books, including the still popular “The Other Wise Man.” He went on to occupy a number of eminent positions, including:

- American Ambassador to the Netherlands and Luxembourg (appointed by his friend, Woodrow Wilson)
- Lieutenant Commander in the United States Navy Chaplains Corps during World War I
- Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church
- Commander of the Legion of Honor
- President of the National Institute of Arts and Letters
- Chairman of the committee that compiled the Presbyterian *Book of Common Worship*

In 1907, Henry van Dyke was invited to preach at Williams College in Massachusetts. At breakfast one morning, he handed the college president a piece of paper, saying, “Here is a hymn for you. Your mountains (the Berkshires) were my inspiration. It must be sung to the music of Beethoven’s ‘Hymn of Joy.’”

When he was later asked about his hymn, van Dyke replied: “These verses are simple expressions of common Christian feelings and desires in this present time—hymns of today that may be sung together by people who know the thought of the age, and are not afraid that any truth of science will destroy religion, or any revolution on earth overthrow the kingdom of heaven. Therefore this is a hymn of trust and joy and hope.”

The Jesus and Holy Communion lesson is available for take-home now. Our next in-person lesson is Thursday, October 19. We will have classes for the 3-6 year-olds from 3:30-4:30pm and then for the 7-12 year-olds from 4:30-5:30pm. Our October theme is the John the Baptist and Baptism. The political instability in Haiti has escalated ever since the assassination of Haitian President Jovenel Moïse. Haiti has also been gripped by inflation, causing rising prices to make many necessities unaffordable. Gang violence is becoming a way of life, making parents afraid to send their kids to school. Clean water is a luxury.

Massachusetts has seen a rise in Haitian immigration and now has a place on the top three list of largest Haitian population.

Why do I tell you this? I have a new Friend.... Actually it's 24 families of new friends. Billerica has become home to 24 Haitian families, and I have had the privilege of working with them. They have seen and lived through cruelty, hunger and inhumanity that I can't even imagine and hope I never do. With everything these humans have had to endure they have never forgotten how to laugh, smile and love their children. They have a spirit to thrive and survive.

I have a new friend and I am humbled every time I visit. They need our compassion.



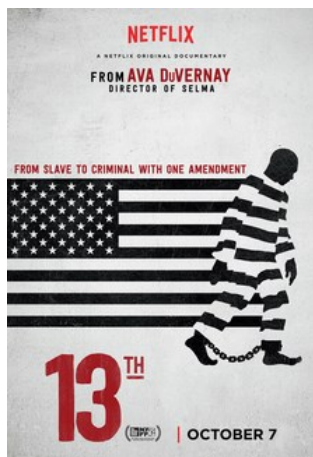

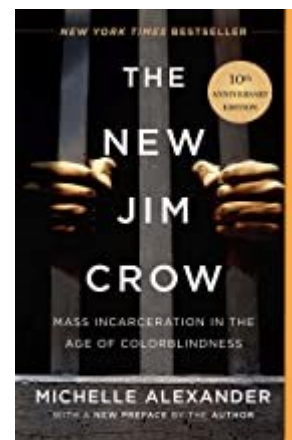


Movie Night

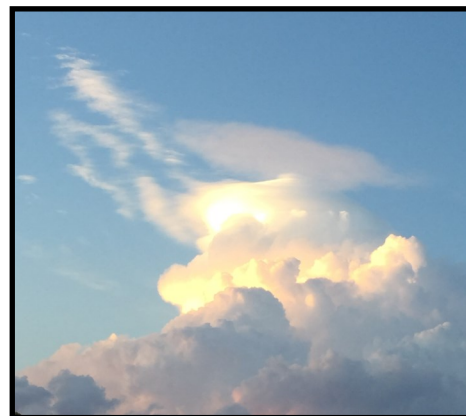
