Maybe by the time you read let's hope we won't be in another cold spell or digging out of a foot of snow. As you're aware, we've had both in the past couple of weeks. This morning much of the snow is gone, but with a temperature of +10F with a wind chill of minus something. A quick trip to the mailbox was enough for me. The parking lot and walkways at the Church were cleared, and remaining patches of ice were handled with Ice-melt and sand. But keep in mind and pass the word: **Do NOT use salt or any product containing salt on the church steps.** With this week's cold spell, I'm happy to report the Thrift Shop workers stayed warm with the new furnace helping to keep out the cold.

The Bequest Committee has decided to focus on one major project, that being making access to the office and Bixby Hall handicap accessible. This will likely require modification of our current ramp and landing in front of the door as well as a wider door entry. We have had an architect in, and we have some idea how to go forward, starting with investigating available grants. You'll hear more about this as we move forward.

We're beginning the process of revising and updating our rental agreements with those who rent space at St. Anne's. In the past, our contracts included general responsibilities such as leaving the place the way you found it, taking care of trash, putting chairs away, etc. During the COVID years, an addendum was added to cover such things wearing masks and the disinfecting items and areas. Additionally, the cost of hall rental has varied considerably over time and from one renter to another. Our objective is to standardize the contracts and establish prices appropriate to how space is used.

Don't forget the Annual Meeting is scheduled for Sunday February 4<sup>th</sup> at 11:30am to give everyone a chance to get coffee and a snack before we begin. I'm predicting sunshine, warmer temperatures and a productive meeting.

## LITURGICAL SEASONS & COLORS + LENT

Some seasons in the Church Year vary in length, like Epiphany and Pentecost. Other seasons, Lent & Easter in particular, have the same number of days, no matter when they start. There are always 50 days between Easter Sunday and the Feast of Pentecost.

Almost all Church seasons begin on a Sunday. Lent is the only season of our Church Year that always begins on a Wednesday. Lent is always 40 days long. This may be as a reminder of Jesus' fasting for 40 days & 40 nights in the wilderness after his baptism. Lent is also the only season in the Church Year that does not count the Sundays in (not of) Lent as part of that season. Maybe that's because every Sunday is a "little Easter." Lent begins in the middle of the week on ASH WEDNESDAY.

Because Lent is a penitential season the liturgical color most often seen is purple/violet, even on the Sundays in Lent. There are no flowers on the altar during Lent. The crosses in some Churches are covered in veils, mostly violet in color, with some changes in the last week of Lent. Things are kept simple. In place of purple, some Churches use what is called a "Lenten array." Think of the sackcloth the people of Ninevah wore to show their penitence as they turned away from their evil ways. Sackcloth is like burlap sacks, a rough cloth quite the opposite of fine clothing. Hangings & vestments like these may be trimmed in crimson (dark, dull oxblood) & in black.

HOLY WEEK is Lent's last week. It follows the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Lent & begins on the Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday. The color changes to Crimson for vestments & hangings, and the veils on the crosses. These veils may be decorated with crossed palms & everyone will receive a palm frond or palm cross to wave during the procession of the cross & during the reading of the Passion Gospel, parts of which are often read by the congregation. The palms may be absent later in Holy Week & the color change to White on MAUNDY THURSDAY when we commemorate Christ's institution of the Holy Eucharist. This service is followed by the stripping of the altar & the removal of almost everything portable from the Sanctuary, leaving it empty as a tomb in preparation for GOOD FRIDAY's Solemn Liturgy.

At some point during HOLY SATURDAY the Church is adorned in white or festival gold & flowers in preparation for the first Eucharist of Easter, often celebrated as the Easter Vigil. More about this when we look at the next Colors & Seasons.

## Wisdom for Worship in February 2024

**One Sunday service will continue at 10:00am** through Easter Day. Our leadership understands there is a desire for summer services to be at 9:00am. We all shall consider how this works for us.

**Preaching by M. Sarah** to close our season of light on February 11, and begin our season of penitence & love on February 18. We are so blessed to have both Lewises among us. They give and they teach from their long storehouses of life in our church. Thank you!

**Begin Lent on February 18<sup>TH</sup> with The Great Litany** Do you remember that we have prayed this grand form of prayer in years past *during* the service? This year, I wanted to try it in its usual spot at the very beginning of the service. By beginning so unusually, a worshipper immediately knows that we are in a new and more-prayerful season of the church. See what other items are different for Lent.

**For our Eucharistic Prayer** (except for Lent V on March 17 with our Regional Canon Martha Hubbard for a Celtic Eucharist and F. Dick preaching), we will use the second prayer from Rite One, and we will use contemporary elements before, around, and within it. We will use the Healy Willan (from the 1940 Hymnal) settings of the Sanctus and Fraction S114 & S158. We will begin the service with the Penitential Order & Decalogue on pp. 351, 350 followed by Confession, Spoken Trisagion (3 Holys), and Collect of the Day. It will feel very different, because it is a very different season of the Church Year. I wonder what we will think!

**Ash Wednesday** We will have two services on Valentine's Day, February 14th, at noon and at 7pm. Neither service will be filmed.

"Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing you have made and forgive the sins of all who are penitent...." (BCP p. 264) So begins the season of Lent on Ash Wednesday. It continues with scripture readings, and one of the few written out instructions to the church. Ashes are imposed upon the foreheads of those who wish them. We respond by saying the 51<sup>st</sup> Psalm, for the first of several times throughout the season. The Litany of Penitence examines every area of our lives affected by our actions and relationships. It is a lot. Finally, the Liturgy of the Word (the first half of the service) concludes with a long and thorough absolution. The Liturgy of the Table welcomes us sinners to the Heavenly Banquet. Always.


